Plaintiff Robertina Breauchy brings this class action lawsuit against Defendant CareGivers America, LLC, seeking all available relief under the Pennsylvania Minimum Wage Act ("PMWA"), 43 P.S. §§ 333.101, et seq.

PARTIES

- 1. Plaintiff resides at 33 North Main Street, Muncy, PA 17756.
- Defendant is a corporation headquartered at 718 South State Street, Clarks
 Summit, PA 18411.

JURISDICTION AND VENUE

- 3. This Court has personal jurisdiction over Defendant.
- 4. Venue in this Court is proper because, <u>inter alia</u>, Defendant regularly conduct business in Philadelphia County. For example, Defendant's website represents that Defendant's Lansdale, PA office serves Philadelphia County.

FACTS

- 5. Defendant is in the business of providing, <u>inter alia</u>, non-medical homecare and companionship services to customers throughout eastern and central Pennsylvania, including within Philadelphia County.
- 6. Defendant employs individuals who are paid on an hourly basis and provide homecare and companionship services to Defendant's customers. These employees who hold job titles such as, for example, Caregiver, Certified Nurse Assistant, CNA, Home Health Aid, and HHA are generally referred to by Defendant as "Caregivers." As Defendant's website explains: "A trained CareGiver will assist customers to safely complete activities of daily living, such as bathing, grooming, transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping, meal preparation, medication

reminders, and companionship." <u>See http://www.caregiversamerica.com/non-medical-home-health-care.</u>

- 7. Plaintiff has been employed by Defendant as a Caregiver since approximately March 2013.
- 8. The PMWA defines compensable work to include, <u>inter alia</u>, the time during which an employee is required "to be on duty or to be at the prescribed work place" and "time spent in traveling as part of the duties of the employee during normal working hours." 34 Pa. Code § 231.1. The PMWA also entitles employees to overtime compensation "not less than one and one-half times" the employee's regular pay rate for all hours worked over 40 hours in a 7-day workweek. <u>See</u> 43 P.S. § 333.104(c). This entitlement extends to Plaintiff and other Caregivers. <u>See</u> <u>Bayada Nurses, Inc. v.</u> <u>Commonwealth</u>, 8 A.2d 866 (Pa. 2010); <u>Grajales v. Safe Haven Quality Care</u>, LLC, 2013 Pa. Dist. & Cnty. Dec. LEXIS 128 (Dauphin Cty. Com. Pl. Sept. 5, 2013).
- 9. In determining the compensable work time that Plaintiff and other Caregivers spend at customers' homes, Defendant generally utilizes the Caregiver's *scheduled* rather than *actual* customer visit hours. This practice results in Plaintiff and other Caregivers receiving no payroll credit for time spent working at customers' homes either before or after the scheduled visit hours. Plaintiff, who often has been required to perform work at customers' homes outside of the scheduled visit hours, estimates that Defendant's above practice has robbed her of hundreds of compensable work hours.
- Also, Defendant generally fails to compensate Plaintiff and other
 Caregivers for all time elapsed between customer visits. For example, if Plaintiff was

scheduled to leave the home of her first customer at 10:15 a.m. and to arrive at the home of her second customer at 11:00 a.m., she often would not be compensated for the entire 45-minute period. Instead, she often would receive "travel time" pay – compensable at the \$7.25/hour minimum wage rate – for only a portion of the 45-minute period. And sometimes, she would receive no travel time pay at all. This is true even though Plaintiff was on-duty during the entire 45 minutes.

11. Moreover, in determining the number of overtime hours worked by Plaintiff and other Caregivers, Defendant does not count any travel time. For example, if, during a particular 7-day workweek, Plaintiff was credited with spending 42 hours at customers' homes and was credited with 3 hours of travel time, she would receive overtime premium pay for only 2 – rather than 5 – overtime hours.

CLASS ACTION ALLEGATIONS

- 12. Plaintiff brings this lawsuit as a class action on behalf of herself and all individuals who, during any time within the past three years, were employed by Defendant as Caregivers, as defined in paragraph 6 above.
- 13. This action is properly maintained as a class action pursuant to Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure 1702, 1708, and 1709.
- 14. The class is so numerous that joinder of all individual members is impracticable.
- 15. Defendant's conduct with respect to Plaintiff and the class raises questions of law and fact that are common to the entire class.
- 16. Plaintiff's claims and Defendant's anticipated defenses are typical of the claims or defenses applicable to the entire class.

- 17. Plaintiff's interests in pursuing this lawsuit are aligned with the interests of the entire class.
- 18. Plaintiff will fairly and adequately protect class members' interests because she and her experienced and well-financed counsel are free of any conflicts of interest and are prepared to vigorously litigate this action on behalf of the entire class.
- 19. A class action provides the fairest and most efficient method for adjudicating the legal claims of all class members.

COUNT I

- 20. All previous paragraphs are incorporated as though fully set forth herein.
- 21. Defendant is an employer covered by the PMWA's overtime pay mandate, and Plaintiff and the class members are employees entitled to the PMWA's protections.
- 22. The PMWA requires Defendant to pay Plaintiff and other class members overtime premium compensation "not less than one and one-half times" the regular pay rate for all hours worked over 40 per week. *See* 43 P.S. § 333.104(c).
- 23. Defendant violated the PMWA by failing to pay Plaintiff and other class members any compensation all hours worked over 40 per week.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff, on behalf of herself and the class, seek the following relief:

- A. Unpaid wages to the fullest extent permitted under the law;
- B. Prejudgment interest to the fullest extent permitted under the law;
- C. Litigation costs, expenses, and attorney's fees to the fullest extent permitted under the law; and
- D. Such other and further relief as this Court deems just and proper.
